A Note from PASTOR JOHN

What's next?

The whole congregation of the Israelites set out from Elim; and Israel came to the wilderness of Sin, which is between Elim and Sinai, on the fifteenth day of the second month after they had departed from the land of Egypt. Exodus 16:1

It had been a while in the wilderness by chapter 16. We are told it is the 15th day of the second month, and by the very next verse the Israelites are complaining to Moses and Aaron, wishing they had never left Egypt. They are sure they are going to starve in this unfamiliar place, and when God does send them bread from heaven, they don't even know what it is at first. (The word 'manna' in Hebrew simply means "what is it?")

I've been thinking of this story lately because there are days I feel like I'm in the wilderness. While my location remains the same, nothing else looks familiar. The landscape of the world has changed. So many routines are disrupted. So many things we've looked forward to are cancelled, postponed, or on hold. It would be easy to fall into line with the complainers in the Exodus story, wishing for a return to what used to be. But that is not helpful or possible, and worse it becomes unfaithful.

God is still with the people of Israel in the wilderness, and day after day sends them enough nourishment for the day. I'm convinced that God is still with the people of ELC in our current 'wilderness' time. While we have been displaced from our building and our routines, God still provides daily nourishment. With God there is always enough – enough grace, enough love, enough compassion. There is bread for our bodies, but more importantly, nourishment for our Spirit.

What next? I'm not entirely sure. You'll see some notes in this newsletter from the council about plans to return to our building in due time. But while the building has been closed; ministry, love, forgiveness and grace are openly offered. We just need open hearts to receive them, and the courage to share them.

DEAR ELC MEMBERS,

First of all, thank you for your ongoing participation in ministry, your love for God and for our community of faith and your support of the work of our congregation and ministry partnerships. There have been many expressions of love and compassion shared during very difficult circumstances. When we closed the doors of the church building to the public over two months ago, it was hard to imagine how much would change and how long these conditions might last.

As you know, we suspended in-person gatherings in mid-March, and we have moved our worship services online and via telephone. We have continued education ministries and other gatherings through online gatherings as well. The office remains open on a limited basis to continue the needed operations of the church. It has become increasingly clear that things will not “return to normal” as quickly as we might have hoped and longed for. It now seems likely that there will be a gradual process of gathering folks within the building in the coming months. Jesus’ instruction to ‘love one another’ leads us to carefully consider how to preserve the health and well-being of our members and neighbors. This means we will be very careful in planning and preparing for the time when we open our building once again.

For now, and at least until June 15th, the building will remain closed to all but essential staff duties, and we will continue with online worship only.

As we look toward reopening, there are a number of things we must consider:

- Many of our members fall into the ‘high risk’ group due to age and medical conditions
- The gathering of people in a confined space for any length of time is discouraged.
- Singing, and even speaking in unison, are activities which are more likely to spread virus.
- How can we manage proper spacing and determine how we limit the number in attendance?
- What procedures do we need to put in place for cleaning and sanitizing before and after anyone is in the building?

- What procedures could we follow for baptisms, and communion?

Our planning group is developing a step-by-step plan to present to the June council meeting. We are using the guidance of the ELCA, the Wisconsin Conference of Churches, the Department of Health, and our insurance company.

We expect that in the coming weeks we will begin to open the building to use by members when certain public health measures are met. We expect a phased reopening as conditions improve.

By the next stage:

- We will continue to provide options for worship online and by phone for people at high risk of complications
- It may become possible to hold in person gatherings. We will be exploring options for how this might work for us. Masks will need to be worn, 6 feet of distance observed, and surfaces sanitized after each gathering. Worship could include recorded or instrumental music, but not singing. Total attendance will be limited by distancing requirements.
- Life rituals (weddings, funerals) could take place in a more traditional way, limited to invited guests, and physical distancing plans.
- Small group may be able to meet with similar mask and distance practices.

Future stages would depend on improving health conditions and could allow more normal gatherings with careful attention to cleaning, avoiding unnecessary contact, wearing masks, or other practices suggested by health professionals. The timing of these stages is difficult to determine at present. If infections increase again, it is also possible that physical distancing recommendations would need to be tightened temporarily in order to get back on track. Our plans may adjust as we go, but we want to be open and honest as we figure this out together.

Year-to-date General Fund income (17 Sundays) is 17% less than prior year (17 Sundays) and 15% less than budget. YTD expenses are 13% less than prior year, primarily due to the vacant intern position, and lower leadership development (canceled synod assembly), spiritual growth, maintenance, utility, and administrative costs; YTD expenses are 10% under budget, primarily due to pay reductions (2nd half March and 1st half April), lower leadership development, spiritual growth, pastoral ministry, youth & family, and utility costs, partially offset by higher insurance cost. There is \$11,493 in the cash balance that we drew from our new SBA Paycheck Protection Program loan account. We expect this loan to be forgiven later this year, at which time we will recognize amounts drawn as income

Year-to-date Building Maintenance Fund income is 40% more than prior year and 26% more than budget. YTD expenses (HVAC repair and tree pruning) are 118% more than last year (HVAC) and 34% less than budget.

BENEVOLENCE

Join Forces with Neighbors Helping Neighbors

So, I know I'm biased, and that you are, too -- but it's hard to argue that we live in one of the best places around. Our community is safe and vibrant. We have high-achieving schools, excellent municipal services, residents who care about putting their best feet forward, strong local businesses and a healthy network of service organizations and church congregations. And now, we have an opportunity to take Mount Horeb's reputation of generosity and concern for others to a whole 'nother level.

Neighbors Helping Neighbors, a new nonprofit with roots in the Community Clothes Closet, is moving forward with its vision to create a resource hub that centralizes under one roof the basic necessities and social services needed by the roughly one-third of area residents who struggle to make ends meet.

You might've heard of NHN because of its recent work to develop a mobile food pantry to address rampant food insecurity caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. Throughout the past few months, NHN has been preparing to expand on the Clothes Closet facility at 102 E. Lincoln St., adding a food distribution center to complement the clothing resource that has served the community since 1997. The target opening date is July 1. NHN was formed through the support and participation of a multitude of area charitable organizations, including the Clothes Closet, the Weekend and Extended Break backpack nutrition program for school-aged children, Community Supper program, Joining Forces for Families, and the Mount Horeb Mental Health and Wellness Coalition. The Mount Horeb Area School District, local clergy and operators of the local Tiny Pantry network have endorsed NHN, which has entered into distribution partnerships with Second Harvest Food Bank and the Community Action Coalition (which operates the federal food program).

The community has embraced NHN with an outpouring of donations, but start-up costs are sizable and strong ongoing support is essential to meet our community's needs. Sometimes, it's helpful to focus fundraising efforts on a particular goal. NHN's most pressing needs are a laptop equipped with software management for food banks, and shelving for the new facility.

One of the driving forces behind NHN is Janna Hansen, the longtime president of the Community Clothes Closet. I'm a fellow board member and have heard her phrase NHN's potential impact very eloquently. I reached out to her to make sure I got it just right.

"Investments in NHN will help our organization elevate the quality of life for everyone in Mount Horeb by providing or connecting our most vulnerable citizens with resources that can empower them to move from a survival mode to a place where they are able to thrive and prosper. An investment today provides a means to a better future for those we serve."

One last thing: "That was the Holy Spirit, not me," Janna says. Faith is moving this project forward. Faith in our community, faith in our mission, and of course, faith that we are doing God's work through our hands.

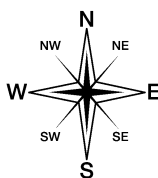
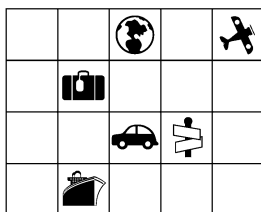


PUZZLE
