ONE ANOTHER A Note from PASTOR JOHN

...Love one another..." (John 15:12.. "Live in harmony with one another..." (Romans 12:16) "...Stop passing judgment on one another." (Romans 14:13) "Accept one another, then, just as Christ accepted you..." (Romans 15:7) "Carry each other's burdens..." (Galatians 6:2) "...Be patient, bearing with one another in love." (Ephesians 4:2) "Be kind and compassionate to one another..." (Ephesians 4:32) "...Forgiving each other..." (Ephesians 4:32)

I hope you notice the "them" in Bible passages above. I could have kept going. The New Testament lists about 59 instances of God's call to live out the faith with 'one another'. Following Jesus is a personal commitment, but it was never meant to be a private one. To follow Jesus means to be committed to the life of the people whom God loves.

As human beings we are created for community, but it is easy to allow ourselves to buy into all the ways that society isolates us, pitting one person against another, privatizing daily life, and glorifying the idea of attending only to your own interests.

We use technology to choose our own music and entertainment, and keyboards replace voices as means of communicating. More than anything we are encouraged to seek our own self-interest rather than consider the needs of others, whether they be our families, our neighbors, or the stranger in our midst. Many have even styled their view of faith into a private matter, seeking only a benefit for themselves.

But God's call is something far different. Paul puts it this way: "Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others." Philippians 2:3-4

Please consider how you might use your life for one another as followers of the one who lived, died, and rose again for you.

BENEVOLENCE

Strengthening our Social Safety Net

The social services net is a complicated and costly endeavor, and can't possibly solve all the pain we see out there in the world. But when you see a group of people and organizations come together to address a problem, it's a beautiful thing.

Recently, I was able to tour the facility The Beacon uses to care for the daytime needs of the homeless population in Madison and surrounding areas. It's a tidy, two-story, modest but highly organized and proactive building on East Washington Avenue, near all the high-rent, high-rise apartments and condos that have gone up recently.

Catholic Charities has taken the lead in operating this facility, made possible through a partnership that includes the city of Madison, Dane County, and the United Way. Demand has exceeded expectations, but a dedicated paid staff and army of volunteers keeps the place humming.

The Beacon offers daily needs such as showers, meals, and laundry service but also a computer lab, housing and employment assistance, and a place for people to receive mail, which is no small thing considering many people receive benefits there and still use mail as their primary communication tool.

The goal at the Beacon is to give people the tools to get their lives back together. That's the same aim at DAIS, which shelters and aids victims of domestic abuse. We supported DAIS through Benevolence a couple years ago and are proud to continue our contributions toward that organization this month, along with the Salvation Army, which tends to the immediate needs of people in unstable situations. Look for updates in the weekly bulletins about how we'll support these groups in September through financial donations and in-kind items, and we'll speak to volunteer opportunities that exist.
