A Note from PASTOR JOHN

"So Great a Cloud of Witnesses"

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God." -Hebrews 12:1-2

This passage comes to mind each year when we celebrate All Saints' Sunday. Each week we see the representations of the saints from the history of the church in the paintings on the sanctuary wall, but on All Saints' we see the images, and our minds are filled, with the memories of those who were our personal witnesses to faith and Christ's love in our life. It's hard to believe, but Advent begins this month! As we prepare for the season of... well, preparation, I thought it might be nice to talk about what Advent is. I know many of you already know, but, believe it or not, I had no idea what the word meant until a few years ago (although I did always have a fondness for those little cardboard calendars with pieces of chocolate waiting each day). I didn't grow up in the church, so for me (and I'm betting for some of you) these church words and seasons and colors can be a bit of a mystery. Until seminary I thought that the paraments (which I called the pretty cloth things) changed color when the pastor decided it was time for a fresh look. So, here is a quick recap of what Advent is.

As I hinted at earlier, Advent is a season of preparation. It is a season in the church year lasting four weeks, during which we wait for the birth of Christ at Christmas, and also for the second coming of Christ. For many Eastern Orthodox churches, Advent is a period of fasting, either from certain foods, or from all food between dusk and dawn. These churches do not always use the same calendar that we do, so their dates for Advent and for Christmas do not always coincide with ours.

The ELCA provides information on which colors have traditionally been used for the paraments in North America, and Advent is often associated with Blue. According to the ELCA website, the move from purple, a more traditional color for Advent, to blue originated in Scandinavia due to the expensiveness of purple cloth and dye. It's interesting to note that the colors we use in North America often have different associations in other parts of the world. For instance, in some parts of the world white represents mourning, and in others red is the color of purity. However, we celebrate Advent, whether it is with fasting or with chocolate advent calendars, it is amazing to think that billions of people around the world are waiting with us for Christ, both the Christ who came before, and the Christ who will come again. Happy Advent, everyone!

Year-to-date General Fund income (38 Sundays) is 11% more than prior year (39 Sundays) and includes \$12,446 of special gifts for Lutheran World Relief; YTD income is 13% less than budget. YTD expenses are 16% more than prior year, primarily due to \$10,396 Lutheran World Relief payments, a \$3,295 World Hunger payment for gifts received last December, intern housing, increased staff hours/pay rates, synod assembly fees, pastoral ministry, worship costs, building maintenance., office equipment, and higher natural gas rates; YTD expenses are 0% less than budget, primarily due to the net effect of higher Lutheran World Relief, World Hunger, worship, natural gas, snow removal, and building costs, partially offset by savings in staff hours, intern costs, and various congregational life expenses.

Year-to-date Building Maintenance Fund income is 13% less than prior year and 15% less than budget. YTD expenses are for repairing the dishwasher, kitchen plumbing, ceiling/wall damage caused by a leak in the kitchen, and stone columns, while prior year expenses were for new eaves troughs and gutters, roof/wall repair, tree/landscape services, and stone/retaining wall repairs.

BENEVOLENCE Eliminating obstacles to basic health care

Did you know that about one in nine state residents navigates life without health insurance? All too often, these folks have manageable conditions that go untreated, leading to serious problems.

Fortunately, there are places like Our Lady of Hope Clinic in Middleton and Community Connections Free Clinic in Dodgeville that have recognized this issue and provide solutions. Both are nonprofit clinics that offer medical visits to the uninsured for little or no cost.

We've featured these organizations regularly through Benevolence the past few years, and will do so again in November at a time when many are struggling with the impact of inflation. Through our donations, we can help people avoid difficult decisions about where to spend their limited discretionary funds – on everyday expenses like gas and food, or the most precious thing of all: their health.

Our Lady of Hope is a Catholic nonprofit clinic that recently moved into a larger facility to serve its growing clientele base, following 13 years and 15,000 patient appointments at its Odana Road location in Madison. The clinic is able to provide care for those in financial need thanks to donations and a membership model where clients with means pay a monthly fee for access to quality, personal primary care. More than 55% of visits are made by patients without insurance, oftentimes working full-time jobs that don't provide coverage.

Community Connections' mission is to provide basic health care to those who cannot afford or access medical services in Iowa County and surrounding areas. CCFC aims to eliminate obstacles to health care one patient at a time. There is no charge to see providers, and prescription medications are provided at little or no cost as needed. Since it's inception in 2006, the clinic has served nearly 3,000 individuals and provided just shy of 15,000 office visits.

Their work is accomplished by 127 medical and lay volunteers and two part-time staff people, and is supported generously by donations from local individuals, churches, businesses and organizations, as well as grants and fundraising events.

At Lutheran World Relief, we envision a future where all people, in every corner of the world can live full, dignified lives.

Lutheran World Relief History

In 1945, World War II left an estimated one-fifth of the world's Lutherans homeless. Here in the United States, Lutheran churches in at least 20 states mobilized to help in Europe through a new agency called Lutheran World Relief.

Much has changed in nearly 75 years. But in thousands of congregations, in millions of offerings and in uncounted prayers, U.S. Lutherans continue to support Lutheran World Relief's work.

Lutheran World Relief was there in the late 1940s, when 800,000 Palestinians were forced from their homes by the creation of the state of Israel ... in the early 1950s when Hong Kong, Korea and Bangladesh and much of Asia was mired in strife ... during the 1970s and '80s, when civil wars and drought plagued Africa.

Today, Lutheran World Relief operates in East and West Africa, Latin America, Asia and the Middle East, helping some of the world's poorest communities build the resilience they need to thrive. Source: lwr.org

MORTGAGE WE'RE GETTING CLOSE - HELP US REACH THE END!

This note is to ask for specific donations to our Mortgage Repayment fund. First of all, thank you for what has been accomplished over the past 11 years. After borrowing \$550,000 during the \$925,000 expansion and window replacement project back in 2011, we've paid down the mortgage to a remaining balance of \$52,123 that is scheduled to be paid off in 16 months. Recently, however, monthly gifts to the Mortgage Repayment Fund have not been keeping up with our monthly loan payments, and the cash balance in the fund has dropped to \$5,494 - a little more than one \$3,630 monthly payment. Let's work together and push this fund over the top, perhaps even paying off the mortgage Repayment Fund so they go to the correct bank account. Thank you for your prayerful consideration of this need!


STEEPLE ECHOES ARTICLES DUE BY Wednesday November 23rd
