Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; ⁵ and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; ⁶ and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. ⁷ To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. - 1 Corinthians 12:4-7

"I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another."

~~ John 15:17 ~~

'What is love? // Baby, don't hurt me // Don't hurt me no more // Baby, don't hurt me // Don't hurt me no more // What is love?'

The one-hit wonder by Haddaway immediately got stuck in my head after reading this scripture from John. We're well past Easter at this point, but it strikes me that the effects of Good Friday are still some of the most hotly debated topics in human history. Jesus' call to love one another as God loves us seems simple on the surface. But what is love? What does it mean to love one another when our world is so full of pain?

Haddaway says that love is pain. I can't disagree with him that we hurt one another as part of our human experience. After all, the disciples' first response to their new commandment is to abandon Christ on the cross, betraying him to the powers of humanity. And yet, does Jesus' love change? Do the disciples turn to hatred after the resurrection? I don't think so.

Love is healing. Over the last several weeks we have seen Jesus return to the disciples after Easter, calming their pain and frustration. He guides them, teaching them the scriptures and showing them what their priorities should be. It isn't an easy process, but this band of hurt people are breaking the chain of hurt.

Love is love. Sometimes we don't need to think out all the possible scenarios. Sometimes we can simply let God be God, and love one another. We can just listen to the music and join Christ in loving the world. Amen.

COUNCIL NEWS cont. ELC SURVEY SUMMARY

This document is meant to be an overall summary of the survey that was conducted towards the end of last year and resulted in 51 responses. This summary is organized into three main areas;

- 1. Highlights of positive feedback
- 2. Highlights on constructive feedback
- 3. Areas of focus for our church

The last section was a product of extensive discussion with the church council to focus on what is most important at this time to take action on.

Highlights of Positive Feedback

Below are actual comments that we would like to share relative to our church and what is going well.

- "Music is wonderful and feeds my soul"
- "I enjoy Pastor Johns sermons and Zach's as well"
- "Feeling a sense of community"
- "Openness and inclusivity"
- "The Signup Genius is very easy to use"

There was a tremendous amount of positive feedback with the majority of it centered around our pastors, our music and the sense of community.

Highlights of Constructive Feedback

Below are actual comments that we would like to share relative to feedback on areas of improvement.

- "Finding ways to have more people actively involved"
- "I would like to return to two service schedules on Sunday"
- "Remove the Pride Flag. We are a place of worship not politics"
- "I would recommend removing the pride flag and replacing with the RIC flag"
- "Start having greeters again"
- "Improve use of social media and website to share everything that is going on"

COUNCIL NEWS cont. ELC SURVEY SUMMARY

There were other comments provided as well that have been discussed with the church council.

Areas of Focus

Based on discussion with the church council and a review of all of the survey responses, we have identified the following topics for next steps.

· Contemporary and Traditional worship

This topic was mentioned numerous times in our survey responses. While the council would appreciate this change, at this point in time we do not have enough attendance to warrant the move back to two services. It was agreed that we would monitor attendance on a regular basis and continue to discuss if/when a change would be made.

Pride Flag

This was a topic that many of our members had strong opinions on. Based on this feedback and extensive discussion with the church council and a recommendation from the Reconciling in Christ (RIC) committee, we will be displaying two flags welcoming all people to our church. There will be two on the front lawn and two on the back.

Welcome and Greeting

This is an area where we do want to make improvements. Specific items that we will address include improved efforts to do the following:

- Welcome existing and new members prior to service
- Create time on a regular basis to welcome each other within service by handshake or a wave.
- Review merit of having small ground dinners with members

Website / Social Media

This is an area where we do want to make improvements. Specific items that we will address include improved efforts to do the following:

- Review an update to our website.
- Identify ways to improve access/use of our existing platforms like Youtube and Facebook for viewing our service.

WORSHIP & MUSIC

The ELC choir will be wrapping up its 2023-24 season with a worship service filled with music on **Sunday**, **May 19 at 9am**. This Worship Through Music service will feature the choir's favorite choral anthems from this season, along with favorite congregational hymns.



TREASURER'S REPORT

Giving in March was under budget, while expenses were normal. Facilities costs were lower than February, in part due to the better weather. Personnel costs were higher, because intern housing was once again paid in the general fund. This cost, which belongs to the general fund, had been shifted temporarily to the designated fund to reduce pressure on the general fund, but the designated internship fund has been depleted (its balance is -\$7,240).

The general fund deficit for March was \$7,748. To add some context, average weekend attendance (not counting Easter) is about 130, which means that an extra \$15 per person would have covered the shortfall. At the end of March, we had \$11,016 in assets against \$1,293 in outstanding liabilities, for a general fund balance of \$9,793. This is much improved from the negative balances we were looking at late last year, but our margin of safety is still rather low.



BENEVOLENCE

NHN: A people-powered resource for our neighbors in need

Did you know that nearly one-third of people who live in and around Mount Horeb struggle each month to make ends meet?

These households are made up of people who work one and sometimes multiple jobs, but don't earn enough to live comfortably. They are people with disabilities, senior citizens on a fixed income, or those who have fallen on hard times due to temporary job loss or illness. They balance a multitude of stressful expenses – feeding their families, paying bills, finding and maintaining affordable housing, and keeping up with the rising cost of goods and services.

Fortunately, we live in an incredibly generous community that has embraced Neighbors Helping Neighbors' vision of providing a resource hub that offers free food, clothing and additional relief services, helping people move from a mode of survival to a place where they can thrive.

NHN survives on people power – and throughout the month of May, we are featuring many ways for the people of ELC to lend a hand to their neighbors through this wonderful, volunteer-led nonprofit organization.

Here are some facts about NHN and ways that you can contribute.

Open hours: Do you know someone who would benefit from visiting NHN? Anyone who lives in the Mount Horeb Area School District and the surrounding rural area is eligible to visit its facility at 102 E. Lincoln St. just south of downtown, which is available at these times:

- Food Closet: Thursday from 6-7:30 p.m., Friday from 9-10:30 a.m. (Seniors preferred) or 3-4:30 p.m., and Saturday from 10-11:30 a.m.
- Clothes Closet: Thursday: 6-7:30 p.m. and Saturday from 10-11:30 a.m.

Volunteering: NHN offers more than 200 volunteer opportunities each month for people of all skill sets and physical abilities. These are short shifts and training is available for more advanced jobs. You can work as often or as little as you'd like; each month, you are invited by email to sign up for whichever opportunities match your availability. To learn more, and to register as a volunteer, visit mthorebneighbors.org/get-involved, email info@mthorebneighbors.org or call 608-437-6114. Huge thanks to Amy Sinner for organizing volunteer NHN opportunities during January, which is ELC's month to provide coverage at the Clothes Closet.

BENEVOLENCE cont.

Material donations: NHN opened its doors during the pandemic and for several years was the beneficiary of government programs that supported food pantries, but now must rely more heavily on purchasing food from key partner Second Harvest Food Bank and food reclamation offers from partners Miller & Sons and Kwik Trip.

NHN also accepts donations directly from community members. Here are some items of particular interest and information on where you can deliver them:

- Food items can be brought to church and placed in our bin in the
 narthex, or delivered directly to NHN during open hours. Right now,
 NHN is in particular need of: white sugar, canned tuna or chicken,
 canned pasta meals (Spaghetti-O's), canned soup, canned pineapple,
 ketchup, mayonnaise, flour, corned beef hash, bottled fruit juice (any
 flavor), salad dressing, boxed dry potatoes, Hamburger Helper,
 pickles.
- Clothing should be taken directly to NHN during open hours. The
 most pressing item is new men's underwear, and NHN also accepts
 clean, gently used, spring and summer clothing and footwear for
 people of all ages. Please do not bring out-of-season items, due to a
 lack of floor space in the facility.
- Personal essentials can be delivered to our bin at church, to NHN during open hours, or to two drop-off locations during business hours: the Chamber of Commerce Welcome Center at 300 E. Main St. and Vike-Steinich Chiropractic at 320 W. Main St. Items in high demand include: toilet paper, cleaning products, shampoo, conditioner, liquid hand soap, dish soap, deodorant, toothpaste, diapers size 4-5-6, pullups size 4T-5T, tampons/pads, disposable razors, facial tissues, paper towels, paper plates, laundry detergent, dental floss, mouthwash, Qtips.
