A Note from A Living Catechism

PASTOR JOHN

Dealm 51.1-17

For our Lenten season this year we will be looking at the themes of a project called "The Living Catechism". This project was born from the idea of revamping the way we communicate the best of Lutheran belief and practice for the 21st century. We wondered if there was a way to introduce a new catechism, not replacing Luther's catechisms, but adding one that speaks to our modern lives in a way that makes our churches feel alive and thriving.

A Living Catechism asks how do we articulate the core understandings of a Lutheran perspective and take seriously the complex realities of life – today. Martin Luther was responsive to the particularities of life in his time, while seeking to be faithful to the Christian Scriptures. A Living Catechism seeks to do the same in our time – be faithful to the Christian Scriptures and be responsive to the unique realities of our time and place.

A strong January followed our record-breaking December, and our financial situation is substantially improved from this time last year. Many thanks to everyone who has contributed to the work and mission of ELC. January's giving was complemented by John Anderson's very generous gift of \$30,000 to support our campership program, making sure that the summer camp program at Sugar Creek is available to all.

We continue to make good progress on fundraising for this year's building capital projects, including a new roof, water mitigation for the basement, and A/C repair in the fellowship hall. January income for the building capital fund was \$6,191, with no monthly expenses.

Designated fund income included \$30,000 for camperships, \$3,187 for youth, \$2,000 for technology, \$25 for Neighbors Helping Neighbors, and \$61 unspecified, with no monthly expenses.

Sharing VBS + Day Camp with the next generation of kids

As a church with a long and proud history, dating to 1887, we've had multiple generations of families come through our doors, with each passing their faith traditions down to the next.

This summer, we're fortunate to have homegrown leadership in place for two staples of our youth programming: Vacation Bible School for kids age 3 through kindergarten, and Day Camp for kids entering first through fifth grade this fall.

Cheyenne Twiton – the spouse of Thomas Twiton – will be directing Day Camp, and Eric Albrecht plans to help with activities as well. Not only is that type of local involvement extra meaningful for the kids who attend, the assistance from these and other volunteers helps to keep costs in check.

And that's important, because we rely on our congregation to donate the \$1,500 needed to create these experiences for kids in our community.

Because of that, every March since the inception of the Benevolence Program 13 years ago, we've collected contributions that expand our youth programming and make our offerings more accessible, through lowered enrollment costs and camperships.

For kids who come to ELC often, these activities let them see church in a new light and inspire greater appreciation for spirituality. For many other children, this might be a rare exposure to what we have to offer, and plant a seed of interest that can last a lifetime.

In both cases, our investment pays tremendous dividends.

At services on the weekend of March 8-9, Youth Director Brenda Martin will provide a full update on our summer activities, which also will include a Give / Love / Serve Service Week from July 14-16 for middle school and high school students, and camp opportunities at Sugar Creek that are funded in part by camperships, thanks to a generous gift from a member of our congregation.


