TREASURER'S REPORT Cont.

General fund income of \$22,737 was less than our general fund expenses of \$29,692, resulting in a monthly loss of \$6,955. We've now had several months of deficit spending, which has reduced the balance in the general fund well below where it stood in January. At month's end we had \$17,368 in assets against \$3,255 in liabilities for a general fund balance of \$14,114.

We raised an additional \$2,701 for the building capital fund, but do not have sufficient funds to finish paying for the roof repair which should be complete this month. We will owe \$22,600 for that project, and the council has voted to use money from the Rose Klir estate fund to help cover the cost.

As of this writing, the congregational meeting to approve a mortgage for upcoming building repairs has not yet happened, but it will have taken place by the time you receive this report. As you know, during very cold weather, the circulating pump is unable to sufficiently heat the Agape wing without being manually set to high, which overheats other portions of the church (like the choir room and restrooms). Replacing the pump necessitates new electrical panels, since the current electrical panels are original to the church, are not up to current code, and do not have replacement parts available. Our estimate is that these repairs will cost \$150,000.

Current mortgage rates for ARM loans fixed for 3, 5, or 7 years, with amortization over 10 to 25 years are between 7.25% and 7.5%, based on the specifics of the loan, with free pre-payment of principal. To give some rough numbers, \$150,000 amortized at 7.5% over 10 years results in a monthly payment of \$1,781. Amortizing over 15 years is \$1,391.

Benevolence for May raised \$978 for Neighbors Helping Neighbors, and \$101 for Divine Savior. Other designated income included \$187 for youth, and \$94 unspecified. Designated fund expenses included \$209 for RIC, \$102 for the kitchen, and \$86 for Compassion International.

BENEVOLENCE

Building a better future

For our summer months of Benevolence, we'll focus on a pair of organizations that offer people in our part of the state opportunities to move their lives forward by investing in themselves.

In July, we'll focus our efforts on **Literacy Network**, an organization that for 51 years now has provided free assistance to help adults improve their skills in English language communications, reading comprehension, and use of information technology. As a result, they advance their careers, help their kids succeed in school, become U.S. citizens, understand health information, or obtain their high school diploma or other degrees.

The organization, based on Madison's South Side, serves approximately 1,400 adults each year; nearly all are people of color who come from low-income households. Some slipped through the cracks of the educational system. Others arrived here from foreign countries without much of a foundation in English.

Adults who participate in at least 100 hours of basic education programs at Literacy Network increase their annual incomes over time by an average of \$10,000, and immigrants who become naturalized citizens have about 10% higher family income. That's a huge impact!

In August, we will feature **Habitat for Humanity of Dane County**, an organization that has made its mark in Mount Horeb and other municipalities in the region – through building new homes for incomerestricted families but now also providing home repair and financial capability programs.

Habitat has built more than 350 homes in Dane County since 1987, offering low- and no-interest mortgages to affordable homes, with an average price of \$262,000 in 2024. Individuals and families must contribute between 275 and 425 sweat equity hours toward construction of their home, and must meet minimum and maximum income guidelines based on household size...

The home repair program, a relatively new addition, helps people maintain and sustain home ownership as they age or face disability. And the financial capability program addresses root causes of financial instability that serve as a barrier to home ownership, helping families improve their credit and budgeting so they can qualify for a Habitat home.

Here are some ways you can support these two organizations:

Literacy Network is always looking for volunteers to provide 1-on-1 training to help students improve their reading and writing, build English language skills, learn basic computer skills, earn their high school equivalency diploma or prepare for citizenship exams. They're also looking for volunteers for data entry and to maintain their library resources. To learn more about Literacy Network, visit their website (litnetwork.org), sign up for their newsletter and follow them on social media.

Habitat for Humanity offers volunteer opportunities at construction sites (no experience is necessary!) and at its ReStore locations on the west and east side of Madison. If you are interested in lending your professional or life skills in other ways, you can serve on one of five committees – including construction, land acquisition, advocacy, ReStore and development. And you can go through ReStore to either donate household construction items or purchase items for your own home projects. To learn more about Habitat for Humanity, visit their website (habitatdane.org) and follow them on social media.

The logo conveys the message of welcome, inclusion, celebration, and advocacy for all, particularly LGBTQ+ individuals, and BIPOC members of the community.

The symbolism on the RIC flag, the welcome statement and logo on the bulletin cover shows that ELC is a welcoming place of worship for all people. It shows that ELC is a RIC congregation and that we welcome everyone. What else could we do as a congregation?

One way is to display the Progressive Pride flag. This flag speaks directly to members of the LGBTQ+ community that we at ELC see them, acknowledge them, and welcome them. By displaying the Progressive Pride flag ELC is making a statement that our congregation is an ally for members of the LGBTQ+ community. The RIC committee supports displaying the Pride flag. The church council supports displaying the Pride
