Pastor's Reflections...

What comes to mind when you hear the word “**stewardship**”? Money? Church budgets? Paying the bills?

- How about: Giving back to God? Our response to God’s grace, goodness, and generosity?
- How about: The life of discipleship? The church in mission? Love of God *and* love of neighbor?

Stewardship isn’t just about money—BUT how we manage and share our financial resources *is* an important part of this practice of faith. It is, perhaps, the most challenging part for many (if not most) of us. There is good reason that Jesus spoke about money more than any other single topic—*except* the kingdom of God. He understood how easily money (our possessions) can become a god / idol in our lives. Jesus said, “*For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also*” [Luke 12:34].

Stewardship = our faith + the way we live our lives. How we live with and manage what God has entrusted to us—our time, our talents, and our treasures—is a matter of FAITH. It *flows out of* our relationship with God... and it *impacts* (positively or negatively) our relationship with God.

The practice of stewardship begins with hearing the good news of Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit works through God’s Word to change our hearts and turn our focus outward—away from ourselves, out toward the needs of others. **The practice of stewardship** continues by living out our response to the good news of Jesus in our daily lives. Simply put: **Stewardship** is “*everything we do after we say ‘I believe...’*”

Our understanding of Christian **stewardship** is grounded in Genesis. In the very beginning, God created the world and all that is in it. God created humankind in God’s own image and set us as “*stewards*” of God’s good creation. What does it mean to be a *steward*? It means to manage and care for what belongs to someone else. We do not own the earth and all that is in it—God does. God has entrusted us with the care and management of all that God has given us—the earth, its bountiful riches, and our relationships with God and each other. That’s **stewardship**.

PASTOR'S REFLECTIONS Cont.

When I think about **stewardship**, I picture the cross. It is about God's relationship with me and my relationship with God (the vertical line), and it is about my relationship with others (the horizontal line). It is about 3 directions: DOWN... IN... and OUT. Let me explain...

In the person of Jesus Christ, **God came DOWN** to us in love—to bring us salvation... to bring us new life. And God continues to come DOWN to us in love in the sacrament of Holy Baptism—where God claims us as beloved children of God and heirs of God's promises... and in the sacrament of Holy Communion—where God meets us, personally, and makes us as one in Christ, connecting us to God and to each other. Our understanding of **stewardship** begins with God coming DOWN to us in love.

Knowing all that God has done for us... all that God has given us, we next **look IN**. How has God blessed us? What has God entrusted to our management and care—our time, our talents, our money / financial resources, our life? How are we sharing and using these gifts in gratitude to God?

When we realize that all we have comes from God and belongs to God, how can we keep it to ourselves? **Stewardship** is about recognizing and sharing our resources and gifts—they aren't ours to keep... they are given to share with others. *"Like stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received"* (1 Peter 4:10).

And that leads us to **looking OUT**. When Jesus was asked which was the greatest commandment, he answered, *"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself'"* (Matthew 22:37-39). **Stewardship** is the way we live out our lives of faith. **Stewardship** is how we use all that God has entrusted to us: our time, our talents, our money, our possessions, our gifts ... our very lives—to further God's work in this work... to share our gratitude for God's love and generosity... to love God and to love our neighbors.

Yes, **stewardship** involves the way we manage and share our money / financial resources. This is an important part of Christian **stewardship**, BUT it's only one part. **Stewardship** also involves the way we talk about and live out our faith and trust in Jesus, our Savior and Lord. It involves how we devote our time and energy to God and God's work. It involves the way we care for the earth and its bountiful resources. It involves our gifts and talents—how we nurture them and share them. **Stewardship** is about how generous we are with ALL that God has entrusted to our care.

PASTOR'S REFLECTIONS Cont.

Dear friends, this interim time is an important time for you, as a congregation – a time for looking back *and* looking forward ... a time for honest assessment and evaluation *and* hopeful visioning and goal-setting... a time for prayer and discernment – What is God calling you to do... and to be... in this place and time (both as individuals and as a congregation)? I urge you to prayerfully consider how you can use and share what God has given you to support the ministry of ELC – now and into the future? Yes, your financial gifts are, of course, always needed; BUT your time and talents—your participation in our ministry together—are also needed... and very much appreciated!

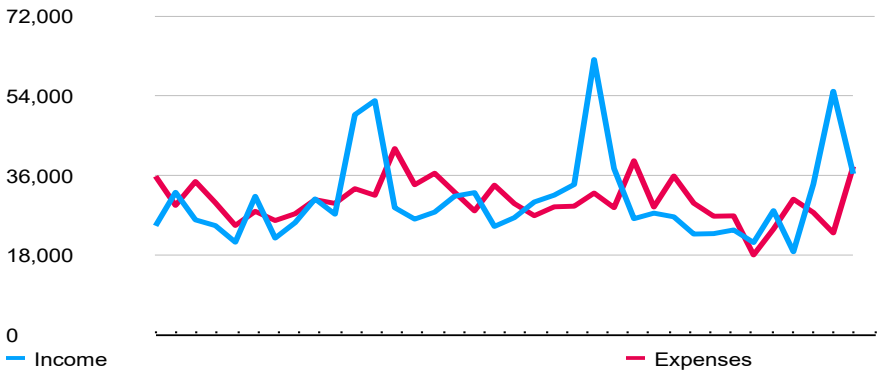

General Fund Income and Expense, Last 36 Months



General fund giving of \$36,346 was offset by expenses of \$37,986, resulting in a deficit of \$1,640. At the end of the month, the general fund had \$35,778 in assets against \$4,825 in outstanding liabilities, for a balance of \$30,121. Facility expenses were higher than forecast due to the winter weather, and the higher personnel expense represents an end-of-year salary adjustment for the senior pastor that reconciles Portico's benefit deductions with our contracted compensation package.

We received \$5,752 in income for the building fund, including a generous \$5,000 contribution. There were no building-fund expenses in January. Benevolence in January raised \$2,168 for Divine Savior. Other income included \$3,237 for youth, \$634 for the mortgage fund, \$150 for the kitchen, and \$108 in interest. Designated fund expenses included \$884 for the mortgage, of which \$758 was interest expense and \$126 a return of principal; \$736 for ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission, \$86 for Compassion International, and \$125 for music.

BENEVOLENCE

A quiet hand when it's needed most

Most months, our Benevolence Program looks beyond our walls. In March, we're turning our focus inward — to the Pastor's Discretionary Fund — but not for the sake of a line item in a budget.

For the sake of people.

Pause for a moment and imagine where someone is in life when they walk into a church — perhaps one they've never attended — and ask for \$20 for gas. Or help with their prescriptions. Or an unexpected repair bill. That step alone often carries more weight than the dollar amount. It usually means options have run thin. Pride has been swallowed. And hope is being tested.

We are deeply grateful for Neighbors Helping Neighbors and our ongoing commitment to support their vital work. NHN provides structured, sustained assistance with food, clothing and utilities, and we will continue to refer people there whenever appropriate.

But sometimes a need is immediate. A tank is empty today. A family has just experienced a fire. A mobile phone that is a family's lifeline breaks. In those moments, Pastor Karen's discretionary fund allows her — drawing on years of pastoral experience — to respond quickly, compassionately and without bureaucracy.

In Pastor Karen's short time at ELC, she has quietly helped with gas, food, rent, and utilities. It has provided dignity in small but meaningful ways. This isn't a new scenario; people often came to Pastor John for help as well, and he was able to tap into this fund to lend a hand.

Your March Benevolence gift equips our pastor to meet people in vulnerable moments with grace, discretion and love. Sometimes ministry looks like \$20 and a listening ear.

IMPORTANT BABY KIT NEWS

Over the years, Rebecca Circle and recently the youth and Sarah Circle members have assembled hundreds of Baby Kits for Lutheran World Relief. Thank you to everyone who has shopped and donated articles of clothing, soap, diapers, etc. We want to share new requirements for the LWR baby kits. Lutheran World Relief is making sure that they are sending quality kits. Please read the following information before shopping or thrifting.

All items MUST be NEW or HANDMADE. The ONLY exception is donated and/or thrifted items that are in "pristine" or "like-new" condition. However, **socks, towels and soap MUST be brand-new.** When Customs officials find stained, unhemmed, or worn items, they penalize LWR and won't release the shipment to be distributed until a hefty fine is paid. Ultimately this can jeopardize the status of the entire shipment.

LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF Cont.

Here is the entire list of needed items for Baby Kits:

- *TWO lightweight cotton t-shirts (no Onesies ®).*
- *TWO long- or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers (without feet).*
- *TWO receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel, or crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn, between 32" and 52"*
- *FOUR cloth diapers, flat fold preferred.*
- *ONE jacket, sweater, or sweatshirt with a hood, or include a baby hat.*
- *TWO pairs of socks, must be new.*
- *ONE hand towel, dark color recommended, must be new.*
- *TWO or three bath-size bars of gentle soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., in original wrapping.*
- *TWO diaper pins or large safety pin*

- Please include sizes from 6 and 24 months.*
- Sweaters may be knitted or crocheted*
- Diapers can be made from flannel or recycling t-shirts. (We appreciate Ann Baumgartner who makes diapers from L and XL, T-shirts)*
- Blankets may be knitted/crocheted, or flannel*
- Gowns or shirt/pant sets can be substituted for sleepers.*
- Please do not donate items with any religious symbols, messages, your group's name, decorated with a U.S. flag, patriotic or military symbols, or references to the armed forces, including camouflage.*

PROPERTY

Custodial

A supplies inventory and reorder spreadsheet has been created for use. So far Jeremy has managed to stay ahead of the snow and salt inside and outside.

A new cleaning schedule is created to better serve the important areas of the 3 buildings.

Maintenance

Karl and Jeremy have completed the transition of fluorescent lights to LED in the fellowship hall. Not only is there better lighting, but less \$\$ to have them on.

Karl continues to look around the buildings for needed work. He's currently "patching" the wooden doors that have suffered from lots of years. He's using wood filler and stain to make them look nice again. He started in the Agape hall and will continue as his "free" time allows.

Also, on the to-do list is painting all of the doorways. As this requires a special paint it will be done during the summer time when Agape isn't in session.

An issue related to the recent dishwasher's Heat Pump (it controls the input of hot water for washing and sanitizing) will be resolved by the time the Echoes goes to print. Because of the rust that comes into the unit from the galvanized pipes isn't filtered out by the screens and ends up in the unit, a filtering unit is being installed between the input water and the input into the Heat Pump. Karl is working with A+ Plumbing to complete the install. This area is not accessible without removing the panel that now allows the use of the garbage disposal switch, Karl will install an open/close access panel.

A few heating issues with the boilers and Air Handling Unit were identified and resolved. Karl was asked to clean out the kitchen ceiling fan and discovered it was inoperable. It has been disabled and insulation put in to eliminate the cold air coming in from the opening to the roof. Further investigation regarding options such as installing a new fan will be discussed with Karl and Jamey (the roof guy) once the weather allows them on the roof.

Other

A recent discussion with Amy Kellesvig revealed floor issues in the hallway related to the condition of the tiles. Karl will measure the area and determine if the 6' stack of like tiles in the mechanical room will be sufficient to replace them. If there is enough supply, a tiler will need to be hired for the job. Once the information is gathered and labor cost solicited, this will be requested in next year's budget.

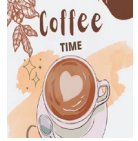

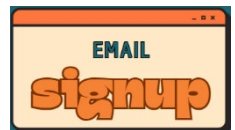

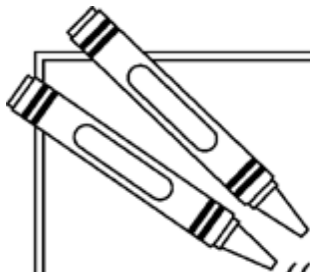
